

INCLUSION CONVERSATION STARTERS

Are you an educator who wants to move authentic inclusive education forward in your school or district? Do you have colleagues interested in developing a shared understanding of inclusion? Do you want to focus on classroom-based practices and the school-wide organizational structures that promote inclusive education? Here are **five** ways you can get a conversation started right now to identify changes YOU can make. Ask one or more colleagues to join you!

ONE

WATCH short videos and use a question to guide discussion. Some of our favorites are:

- <u>What is Inclusion?</u> a four-minute video that shows authentic inclusive education.
- Shelley Moore's <u>5 MOORE minute series</u>. Some of our favorites are <u>Dr. Baked Potato</u>, <u>Under</u> <u>the Table</u>, <u>Design Backwards to Move Forward</u>, and <u>Show me the Purpose</u>.
- Films and videos by <u>Dan Habib</u>: <u>Including Samuel</u> and <u>Samuel in middle school</u> are about his son's journey to inclusion; <u>Thaysa</u>, a young girl severely impacted by autism who is also an extraordinary piano player; <u>Axel</u>, a story about a young boy's communication journey; and <u>Intelligent Lives</u>, which focuses on young adults as well as the importance of inclusion.
- <u>Ruby's Inclusion Story</u>, a video about a girl with Down syndrome.
- Films by SWIFT Education Center that feature the <u>Henderson School</u> in Boston—a charter school designed to include children with significant disabilities—as well as <u>Together</u> and <u>Whatever it Takes</u> filmed in Maryland, Mississippi, and Oregon.

TWO

 - o One thing that I can contribute to promote inclusion in our school is...
 - One way to engage our parent community in this discussion is...

FIVE
